Rallies and Rebellions in 2025

This year didn't begin as Democrats hoped-- the inauguration of Trump & Vance shattered all dreams of preserving democracy from the implementation of Project 2025. Instead, we have faced the nightmare with determined people-power activism.

Democrats are building grassroots coalitions on social media and on the streets--coalitions that have gone national, such as Indivisible and 50501 - fifty protests, fifty states, one movement. The first 50501 protests were a decentralized rapid response to the anti-democratic and illegal actions of the Trump administration and its plutocratic allies.

On social media, Facebook pages that were for Harris and Walz were relabeled as local groups for democracy. The page administered by local activist Julie Thaler, Gainesville Women for Democracy, is now 2.2 thousand strong! They have organized protests on the streets of Gainesville and Alachua, and joined the protests in Palatka. Our sister club, Putnam County FL DWC, is the driving force for the many protests in front of the County Courthouse in Palatka.

They organized rallies for Josh Weil's campaigning for Congress, Hands Off (all the services Trumpets and Doge Muskrats want to do away with), pop-up protests in support of the migrant workers in South Putnam, for county citizens who rely on SNAP and Medicaid, and for Vets on D-Day. The big protest on June 14th, Flag Day, was the NO KINGS! rally, which was the same day as DJT's birthday military parade in DC. Military parades are for victory in war, not a felon's





birthday! The parade was hugely expensive and absolutely disgusting. The protests in the streets were huge. There will be more.

A great number of my friends, acquaintances, people I don't know, and I have and continue to be street protesters. We, mostly women, though more men are beginning to join us, stand in the

heat and auto exhaust, endure rude shouts, thumbs down, and the finger, plus harassment by paid Republican instigators. We are persistent. We believe in the United States as a democratic country. Like the Ukrainians we refuse to give in to oligarchs and fascism. As Illinois governor J. R. Pritzer said, "We must be everywhere - all at once!"

Phillip Miner joined us from Jacksonville. He is the current Co-Chair of the DEI committee for the Democratic Women's Club of Florida (DWCF) and the Chair of our Region V of the DWCF. Throughout his work life and retirement, he has had extensive experience in leadership in the areas of minority rights. He was the keynote speaker and led the People of Color table.


Josh Florence is an EMT studying to become a hospital administrator, and led the Health Issues table, along with our members Nicole Wagner, an occupational therapist, and Fran Rossano, a retired nurse.

Lucia Sanchez was to lead the Immigrant Issues table, such a crucial subject these days, but she had a family emergency which kept her from participating. One of our members, Linda Osborne, filled in for her.

The people at each table discussed their issues, and tried to offer solutions, with a scribe to report back to the whole group.

The Health Issues table reported first. So many of our seemingly difficult issues have such a simple solution: Medicare for All, or Single Payer Health Insurance. Currently, insurance is intentionally confusing and patients are not well-informed, because it is just too complex. Insurance companies control what health care you can receive. Because there are no case managers sitting in on appointments, every patient needs to bring their own advocate. When vaccine scheduling becomes optional, insurance companies will no longer cover them.

There is a shortage of medical professionals, and a serious lack of hospitals in the whole



area from Gainesville to Orlando. Medicaid expansion could have kept rural hospitals open. Med schools of all types need to expand, yet student loan programs are being dismantled by the Trump administration.

Hospitals and other institutions struggle to prevent the spread of contagion. This is a direct result of outsourcing laundry and housekeeping services to the lowest bidder. Previously, these jobs were strictly supervised by the hospital's sterilization department.

As Democrats we advocate for a simplified health care system that covers everyone, while the current administration intends to cut Medicaid, which will be devastating, and does nothing to secure Medicare.

The People of Color table had a great discussion, with a few solutions. Phillip Miner made the point that things really have gotten better during his lifetime, but so many of the gains are threatened under Trump. The solution? Everyone – VOTE!

The racial prejudice and cultural limitations remaining can perhaps be addressed by creating discussion and social groups of black and white people equally.

To expand the employment of black professionals, networking is essential. When there is a job opening, find a person of color who would be great there, and encourage them to apply.

Connect with young people and tell them about Martin Luther King, Jr., Mahatma Gandhi, and all the non-violent leaders who were so effective.

The Religious Issues table was led by Marilyn Eisenberg, and reported by Cindy Watkins. The table welcomed people from Earth centered, Mennonite, and Muslim people, plus a protestant backslider, a current Presbyterian minister, and an artist with Quaker affiliation. There are real differences between cultures, and they need not be turned into stereotypes. Unfortunately, stereotypes perpetuated, especially the anti-Israeli anger over the war, false perceptions of the US Jewish population, and historical ignorance where Muslims are concerned. Our elected leaders need to consider what laws and regulations can work well for people of all religions, not just the dominant religion. They suggested stepping out of who you are, to see how others live. If you feel afraid, find the things you have in common with other groups or with your neighbors. At this table there was some laughter, some common agreement, some new understandings.

At the **Same Sex Marriage table** led by Sammi Johnson and Sierra Wilkes, women (continued next page)

shared coming out stories, each one different, but all involving being bullied for being different. Same sex marriage is not widely accepted, especially in the workplace. When you are facing the threat of discrimination at work, you feel forced to hide, and then you are afraid of being discovered. There are accepting workplaces, if you search them out, as Sammi and Sierra both had to do.

There were many, many same sex marriages performed in the days between Trump's election and when he took office. In Florida the laws and regulations around marriage, employment, and housing vary from county to county and city to city. Sometimes the people at this table felt they were waging an uphill battle and were discouraged with the current political climate. However, they know each of the rights we do have began with a struggle. The arduous climb is worth it.

There was also a Lesbian table, led by Corky. If you haven't heard of the Johns Committee, look it up. Lesbians are also parents, elders, members of minority groups, etc. Women's

issues are lesbian issues. The contributions by lesbians to western culture are not told, even within the alphabet soup of organizations – lesbians are discounted and erased.

Second wave feminism emerged from the University of Florida through the wide circulation of the <u>Florida Papers</u>, brought to NYC by the authors. Now, lesbians ask that their organizations, built up in the last 50 years, not be erased.

As females, individuals and lesbian couples earn less than men all their lives, often living in poverty when they retire. If they don't have children, they often end up going it alone as they age.

Democrats need to be good allies – stopping the book bans, and the banning of lesbian organizations, especially in high school and college. Protect the rights that have been gained so far, don't let them be terminated by the MAGA crowd.

Finally, the Elder table led by Mary Savage, reported on the challenges and solutions they identified. There are many threats to the longevity of Social Security, from DOGE cuts to the declining workforce population currently paying into the system. Hospitals are closing and affordable housing is almost non-existent. The main solution is in the voting booth. Elect leaders who will protect and stabilize Social Security, and address the healthcare issues covered by that table. Hold politicians accountable!

Get help with the complex medical and financial institutions we face by finding an advocate. Many elders face isolation, and need to cultivate relationships through church, neighborhoods, and incorporating young people within your circle.

Julie Thaler and Pam Smith co-chair Gainesville Women for Democracy, which grew out of Gainesville Women for Harris. It is shocking that we need an organization and a campaign for Democracy, but we do. Pam is in charge of actions and events and Julie does coalition building and voter rights. They started as soon as Harris declared her candidacy, with sign-waving every Saturday, and Debate Watch parties. They also scheduled canvassing as often as possible, talking to people where they live. Now, they coordinate with the 50501 movement and other local activists.

They have some advice for us:

We need to continue canvassing; there is no time to rest! Canvassing has been proven to be the most effective way to get out the vote. Stay positive and be FOR something, not just against what is wrong. Find what you love to do, and do that.

Pam Smith became active in movements such as Women's Liberation and the Gainesville Women's Health Center in 1973, Black Power, Native American Rights, and the Anti-Nuclear Power campaign. She was part of the Women's Peace March in December 1983, walking from Gainesville to Key West.

Julie Thaler became politically active in 2016 when Hillary Clinton was running against Trump. In 2017-18 she organized teams in Alachua and Putnam Co.'s, called "Yes to Second Chances" to get Amendment 4 (the restoration of voting rights for returning citizens) on the ballot. She chairs the ACLC Criminal Justice Reform committee, leads the Restoration of Voting Rights for the Gainesville LWV with a focus on rural communities, and she's a member of the Alachua Co. NAACP.


June: Digital Democracy







Letter to the Editor on Alligator Alcatraz

Dear Editor,

The estimated annual cost to operate the "Alligator Alcatraz" migrant detention facility in the Everglades is \$450 million, with Florida initially funding the costs and reimbursement from FEMA. Now, DeSantis is proposing opening another immigrant detention center at Camp Blanding, near Starke. How much more will this facility cost the taxpayers? According to the libertarian CATO Institute, undocumented immigrants commit



crimes at half the rate of American citizens, pay more in taxes than they receive in benefits, and do work no American will do (like the dozens of migrants I've observed picking watermelons near my home recently). As we enter the hurricane season, who is going to repair all the flooded houses and damaged roofs? Who is going to harvest the crops? Idella Parker: From Reddick to Cross Creek




Whether you are a native Floridian or not, *Idella Parker: From Reddick to Cross Creek*, will transport you back in time to "Old Florida". Idella was the housekeeper and cook for Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings and her first book, *Idella: Marjorie Rawlings' Perfect Maid* detailed her ten years from 1940 to 1950 with Rawlings. This memoir, however, tells two intertwining stories.

Her relationship with the often moody Rawlings is interesting in that Rawlings was generous and treated her like family some time but would not, for example, allow her to eat in the same room with her. Far more interesting is Idella's portrayal of a woman of color with limited prospects growing up segregated in the south. Her descriptions of her hometown, Reddick, with the railroads, lime factory, and homes is hard to imagine in the Reddick of today.

The role of the black community in educating their children, encouraging responsibility and helping neighbors gave children like Idella options other than agricultural work. Idella and her siblings became teachers and other professionals. Idella followed many career paths becoming a professional chef, a hairdresser owning her own shop, and a well known public speaker. She lived to 101!







The highlight of the book were pictures she included. In addition to Rawlings' Cross Creek home and scenes from Reddick were pictures of Rawlings' Crescent Beach house, (still there), and her husband's St. Augustine house, (also still there).

Overall, an insightful, easy read of Idella and Marjorie's relationship and a step back in time to Old Florida.





Fever Beach



If the news has you down and you are in need of a little comic relief this summer, then you might want to check out Carl Hiaasen's latest book called Fever Beach. This time around, he takes on Florida politics in all of its present-day absurdities. The plot really doesn't matter, but it revolves around a right-wing (so called) patriot's group called the Strokerz for Liberty who are determined to take back America from migrants, Jews, and people of color. A sexuallyperverted Panhandle Congressman is involved in a scheme to funnel money from elderly philanthropists determined to give away their fortune. They agree to give millions to a Habitat for Humanity type organization based on building houses with child labour. Yes, there is much more to the plot but the pleasure of this book lays in laughing along with Hiaasen's often biting humor.
